This event holds a special meaning for Pauline as, like most of us, cancer has touched both family members and friends. In addition to being a long time gift shop volunteer, Pauline is a past president of the Lowell General Hospital Auxiliary, and presently serves as Corresponding Secretary. After many years of dedicated service to Lowell General Hospital and its mission, Pauline announced she will be stepping down this spring.

Anne-Marie Sousa is the President and Founder of Catie's Closet, a 501(c) nonprofit organization, which she started in 2010 in memory of her daughter. Catie's Closet improves school attendance by providing clothing and toiletries to children in need. The organization works on the front lines, battling child poverty, right where kids need to be – in their schools. Catie's Closet currently operates in over 80 schools in the Greater Lowell, Boston, southern New Hampshire and Springfield areas.

After 30 years in the banking industry, primarily as VP of Marketing & Financial Education at Jeanne D'Arc Credit Union, Anne-Marie is now the Director of Marketing at The Arbors Assisted Living Community in Dracut, MA where she hopes to provide compassion and understanding to families as they transition their loved one to assisted living.

Anne-Marie has been recognized as a Credit Union Hero by Bankers & Tradesman, was inducted into The Lowell's Sun's Salute to Women Program, and was named an Unsung Heroine by the Massachusetts Commission on the Status of Women, in addition to several other awards and recognitions. She is a proud graduate of the inaugural class of Public Matters, the City of Lowell's Leadership and Civic Engagement Initiative.



Looking back over the past twenty five years to the inception of "Daffodils and Desserts" provides an opportunity to view how this event has evolved from a bake sale that also sold daffodils for the American Cancer Society to the present day when all proceeds benefit the Lowell General Hospital Cancer Center.

At the time of its inception, the Auxiliary was looking for a new endeavor to raise funds that could help contribute to our annual gift to the hospital, while also providing an opportunity for members to participate and socialize. Hearing how bake sales were held in the United Kingdom in conjunction with the blooming of daffodil gardens, we thought that this idea would work for our organization and "Daffodil and Cakes" came into being in March of 1996. At the time, the hospital supported the American Cancer Society and sold daffodils through the various departments of the hospital. We joined in that effort by taking orders for daffodils and asked members to provide home baked goods and desserts. For our efforts, we sold \$221.50 that first year and turned over \$360 to the American Cancer Society.

In 1999 the name was changed to "Daffodils and Desserts" as we realized that we were offering more than cakes and our name should reflect our expanded goods. Interest in this event grew each year and the goal was always to surpass the previous year's sales. In 2002, gift baskets were added to our offerings and we passed the \$1,000 mark for the first time.



The following year, 2003, the Board voted to purchase specific items that the Cancer Center requested and thus began our presentation of gifts to representatives of the Cancer Center at our annual meeting. Our first specific gift was a phlebotomy chair and since then we've bought BOSE acoustic systems, chairs for



the Patient Resource Room, a puzzle table and chairs, a large TV, DVD player, video cart and videos, comfortable chairs for visitors of patients undergoing chemotherapy, books, acrylic covers for quilt displays, chairs for the infusion area and thousands of dollars in gift cards for holiday dinners. In total our donations amount to \$57,944.

Another change came in 2014 when the American Cancer Society announced that it was discontinuing the daffodil program. To this date, the Auxiliary had raised \$14,435 for the American Cancer Society. After discussion, it was decided to continue the event and a source for the flowers was found. That same year we were able to add an additional site on the Saints campus which greatly helped our efforts. Now all our profits would be directed to the Cancer Center at Lowell General Hospital in direct benefit to its patients. Last year that amount was \$6,400.



As spring arrives and we mark our 25th year on March 26th, we are confident that the generous nature of Auxilians, patients and visitors will support our efforts and exceed our expectations as we provide a day of colorful daffodils and the hope they provide for all. We invite you to join us and participate in this day of celebration!
